As the south was brought to its knees all commodities in this war-ravaged area became scarce, including paper products. Southerners had to improvise and make do with whatever was at hand, as reflected in this cover, which is a home-made envelope addressed to Edward S. Brown, Esq., Ballsville, Powhatan County, Virginia. The enclosed letter speaks of Archer, a slave the writer had hired from his owner. Archer was later sold and the new owner complained that he didn't have winter clothes. The writer states that he didn't feel it was his responsibility to supply him with winter clothes but that he had made assignments for his shoes. The writer also mentions that he is in an army hospital and needs a nurse and would therefore like to continue with the services of Matilda, another slave owned by the addressee.

The letter is dated Dec. 15, 1865 and the cover is franked with the ten-cent Jefferson Davis stamp, with an illegible postmark.

The attention of the Regtl. Com-  
mander has been called by the Adjutant General  
of the State of Massachusetts, to the necessity of  
immediate compliance by Company Commanders,  
with General Orders No. 17 from these Head  
Quarters, dated August 22d, 1864.

By neglecting to comply with the order men  
twined above, Company Commanders prevent the men  
under their command from obtaining the State Bounty  
which is their due, and upon which the families  
of many of them depend.

It is hoped that no more instances of this  
neglect will occur.
