We are of the opinion that:

It is GENUINE as described. The left margin of the stamp is trimmed into the design. The envelope is slightly reduced at top and has some minor stains and wrinkles.***

We examined the item submitted by the applicant that is described and pictured below:

CSA SC 1b (5c dark green) pair tied on patriotic envelope (CC Type SM-1, verse 45, slogan 35) by "RICHMOND / V- // Dec / 7" postmark. Addressed to Woodruff's, S. C.***

We are of the opinion that:

It is GENUINE as described. The right stamp of the pair is folded over the top of the envelope and is stained at the fold. There is a small nick just into the design of the right stamp above the "ST" of "POSTAGE." The envelope has a small tear at top left and a minor stain at lower center.***

1) The recipient was **Eliza F. Vaughan**, 25 August 1837 to 11 March 1905. She was married to George W. Vaughan, 9 December 1835 to 31 March 1905. He was a Corporal in E. Graham's Co. Va Horse Artillery, (Petersburg Artillery). Both are interred at Blandford cemetery, ward D-OG Square 63, Section 6, in Petersburg, Va.

2) Her father was Reuben Rolfe 1780 - 1853, born in Mecklenburg cty Va, died in Dinwiddie cty. He had been a Corporal, 1st Reg't. (Yancey's) Virginia Militia, during the war of 1812. In 1830 married Elizabeth F. Audas and they had four children:

John Reuben Rolfe - son born in 1831 - in Mecklenburg cty (Va.) 3rd Virginia Cavalry.

Eliza Francis Rolfe - daughter 1837 - 1905 born in Dinwiddie cty Va.

William S. Rolfe - son - born in 1840 - 3rd Virginia Cavalry.

Ada A. Rolfe - daughter - born in 1849

3) This cover has been made out of an unused pink ledger page, folded with the printed side inward.

4) This seems to be a genuine Confederate era cover, the only questionable detail is the ID of the postoffice.
